It can be used as a skirt with a belt, included to wrap over one shoulder, hooded, or worn (unfolded), as a blanket.

Beaumont Highland Dancers performing the Scottish Sword Dance Scottish warriors would perform this dance the night before battle.

If a warrior stepped on a blade, it meant he would die in battle the next day.

When present day Highland dancers compete, they lose points if they step on the blade.

Competition is governed by the rules and regulations of the Royal Scottish Official Board of Highland Dancing (RSOBHD)...



This "Poking fun at the Irish" dance shows a Leprechaun teasing two milkmaids,

while twirling his Shillelagh.

A shillelagh is a wooden cudgel, and the word is pronounced "shuh-lay-lee." A shillelagh is an Irish style of stout, knobbed stick that can function as a weapon.



Adult Highland Cow or "Heeland Coo" as the Scots pronounce it.

This beauty did not want his picture taken so constantly turned his head away from me.

Sheep, goats, birds of prey and Irish Wolfhounds were also on display....and a petting zoo for kids and big kids.

Decide what kind of trip it will be. Will you fly or drive?

Conduct basic research before going & take notes with you.

What records do you need to take with you? Archive notes, BMD info, copy of Land Titles

Take a cell phone, camera, pen & pencil, eraser, flash drive, portable scanner (if you have one).
