



Alix Wagon Wheel Museum

For our September meeting, we took a road trip to Alix, Alberta. We had arranged to meet three Alix Wagon Wheel Museum members for a tour.

Irene Parlby

The first thing we saw, as we entered the museum itself, was a model dressed in a beautiful black dress that Irene Parlby brought with her from England when she came to Canada.



Mary Irene (nee Marryat) Parlby was born 1868 and died in 1965. These words are printed on the back of the pamphlet from the official Opening Ceremony of the Alix Centennial Park 1967. "A resident of the Alix area from 1896 to 1965, an able legislator, a member of the distinguished "Group of Five" who led the movement for the admission of women to the Senate of Canada, Mrs. Parlby rendered significant service in the fields of education, social welfare and legislative reform."



At the Museum, there is a poster listing nurses' duties in 1887. The number of duties, in addition to caring for 50 patients, is shocking!

Nurses' Duties in 1887

The following job description was given to floor nurses by a hospital in 1887:

In the addition to caring for your 50 patients, each nurse will follow these regulations:

- 1. Daily sweep and mop the floors of your ward, dust the patient's furniture and window sills.
- 2. Maintain an even temperature in your ward by bringing in a scuttle of coal for the day's business.
- 3. Light is important to observe the patient's condition. Therefore, each day fill Kerosene lamps, clean chimneys and trim wicks. Wash the windows once a week.
- 4. The nurse's notes are important in aiding the physician's work. Make your pens carefully; you may whittle nibs to your individual taste.
- 5. Each nurse on day duty will report every day at 7 a.m. and leave at 8 p.m. except on the Sabbath on which day you will be off from one to 2 p.m.
- 6. Graduate nurses in good standing with the director of nurses will be given an evening off each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if you go regularly to church.
- 7. Each nurse should lay aside from each pay day a goodly sum of her earnings for her benefit during her declining years so that she will not become a burden. For example, if you earn \$30 a month you should set aside \$15.
- 8. Any nurse who smokes, uses liquor in any form, gets her hair done at a beauty shop, or frequents dance halls will have good reason to suspect her worth, intentions, and integrity.
- 9. The nurse who performs her labours and serves her patients and doctors without fault for five years will be given an increase of five cents a day, providing there are no hospital debts outstanding.



The Ice Box

Towards the back of the Alix Museum, I discovered an Ice Box. My personal connection to an ice box is through my memories of my dad bringing ice into the house using ice tongs. We had an ice box for a time before getting a refrigerator.

I also remember my maternal grandmother telling me about hitching up the horse to the stone boat (see picture below) and going to the nearest frozen river or lake to haul ice home. The ice blocks had been precut by icemen. Grandma had to do this herself following the death of my grandfather, leaving Grandma with seven children to raise....but that's another story...




There's a paper on the front of this antique ice box that gives some history of the ice box, and I quote:

"It wasn't until the 1800's that there was a way to store ice in the home. Most ice boxes were made of wood with an interior lined with tin, cork or zinc. Because the ice would eventually melt, a drip tray was placed underneath the ice box to catch the melt. The tray had to be frequently emptied."

There is another room at the back of the Alix Wagon Wheel Museum that is mostly dedicated to past wars.




It has some interesting exhibits such as this gas mask.
